July is Smart Irrigation Month

July is the official start of the Smart Irrigation Month Celebration — a time to increase awareness of the value of water we use. The use of fertilizers now prohibited in Miami-Dade County during the rainy season

With Miami-Dade County now in the rainy season, the use of fertilizers containing nitrogen or phosphorus is prohibited from May 15 through October 31. Applying fertilizer during the rainy season increases the chance that it will wash away into local bodies of water. Fertilizers contain nutrients that can be harmful to lakes, canals and especially Biscayne Bay. Excess nutrients from our urban watershed are affecting the health of Biscayne Bay, and has contributed to seagrass die-offs and algal blooms in the bay. The County's new fertilizer ordinance includes other regulations for the use of fertilizers, including a ban on fertilizer application near surface water bodies such as canals, wetlands, lakes or the Bay and guidelines for proper fertilizer use. Do your part to help protect Biscayne Bay and follow the regulations of the new fertilizer ordinance.

It's that time of year again! Be prepared for Hurricane season

Save your sewer lines and think before you flush

Help protect our sewer system and help prevent sewer pipe breaks and wastewater overflows by only flushing the 3 Ps: poop, pee and toilet paper. Disposing of wipes and other unflushable items down your toilet can clog the sewer lines and damage pumps and other equipment. Not only are these problems expensive to fix, but they can also cause sewage overflows into homes, businesses and local waterways. Think trash, not toilets! Find out more about what not to flush.

Did you know...

... That you need at least one gallon of water per person, per day, for three to seven days after a hurricane? Stocking an emergency water supply should be one of your top priorities so you will have enough water on hand for yourself and your family. Also, make sure to have a half gallon per pet, per day for three days. Invest in water storage containers that can be used year after year. It is recommended not to fill containers until your area is under a hurricane warning.
